# **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

### **EDUCATION:**

#### Early Childhood Education:

❖ In addition to the sprinklers, bubbles and water toys, we added a big blow up pirate ship with pirate hats to our terrace play. The children used their imaginations and pretended to be pirates out at sea. We also had the Jam with Jamie musicians visit us again to sing and dance with our children and teachers. On Friday, we enjoyed ice cream and cake made by our kitchen staff to celebrate summer fun and friends.

#### After-School & Camp:

- ❖ Camp Henry Day Camp@134 ended the 2017 camp season this week with indoor swim, a Carnival, a trip to The Liberty Science an all camp field day and a special tribute performance to The Wonderful World of Disney and Pixar. In the spirit of special friendships made many campers created their own autograph books so that they could stay in touch. Campers and parents left Friday excited about the experience and parents saying they could not wait for 2018.
- This week, JRC Camp Henry held its last trip of the season to the Liberty Science Center. Halfway through the trip, the facility issued an unexpected fire drill. Kudos to our campers who kept their cool throughout the entire exercise, and our staff who acted with professionalism while guiding the children to safety. While waiting for the facility to reopen, in true Henry Street fashion, we represented our camp with loud, boisterous chants. Everyone in the parking lot knew who Camp Henry was on that day. JRC Camp Henry also held a dress rehearsal in anticipation of its summer showcase next week. Finally we wished our Education Coordinator, Kathryn Keith, a fond happy birthday with a surprise ice cream cake. We continue with our art and stem enrichment activities as we head into Week 8, looking forward to ending the camp season with a strong finish.
- This week, the community was thick with tension from the residues of the Charlottesville Virginia riots. On Tuesday, our Activity Specialist Ms. K discussed the confederate flags hanging clear in site from JRC. The youth watched "Rhythm Nation" by Janet Jackson, "They Don't Care About Us" by Michael Jackson, "Stop the Violence Movement" by KRS-One and other various artists. They discussed how these artists used dance and song as a way of protesting. On Friday, they continued researching artist's videos and watched The Story of O.J. by Jay-Z. Some participants had an emotional time and were able to cry and reflect about the direct traumas POC communities face daily through Jay-Z's work. Our hope is to continue having conversations about how we as Cornerstone Evening program can take actions through art.
- This week at PS20 was "Wall-e" theme week where the campers explored everything about outer space, recycling, and the future. Unit A created straw rockets where they each learned about distance and measurement by testing which went the farthest in a friendly competition. Unit B and Unit D practiced precision, artistry, and independence by designing and making their own individual robots out of toilet paper rolls, paint, construction paper, felt, and other materials. They also practiced cooperation by creating large team robots by decorating and assembling boxes and egg cartons with paint, foil, etc. Unit C made edible galaxy planet Rice Krispie treats from scratch using food coloring, marshmallow fluff, and Rice Krispie cereal. Our campers also enjoyed their last trip for the summer to the Liberty Science Center. To bring Summer Camp to a close, the campers showcased all of their hard work to their parents and guardians in their "Classroom museums" that they set up to display all 7 weeks of projects and activities.

❖ This week at Brooklyn Lab students attended a trip on Friday to the Museum of the Moving Image, where they learned about how movies are made and attended a tour about Jim Henson and the making of muppets. Students had a great time overall.
