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The Plavhouse **Celebrates a Century** of Performance

From the moment Henry Street's Neighborhood Playhouse opened in 1915, the performances on its stage have been pioneering, experimental and often provocative. It presented new works by George Bernard Shaw, James Joyce, Eugene O'Neill; a play directed by Orson Welles; and, under the leadership of Alwin Nikolais, pioneered modern dance. Paul Taylor made his debut on its stage and Martha Graham was an instructor. The building itself is a New York City historic landmark.

Stay tuned for the 2015 Centennial Season, which will include performances by Basil Twist, The Civilians, Mabou Mines, David Greenspan, David Neumann, Sibyl Kempson, Will Rawls and more, as the Abrons continues to push boundaries by presenting ambitious and innovative multi-disciplinary performances from emerging and vanguard artists who represent the past, present and future of the Abrons Arts Center.





The Abrons received the Ross Wetzsteon Award, presented to a theater that nurtures innovative new plays and artists. A \$1,000 grant accompanies the award, which is named for the former theater editor of The Village Voice.

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An OBIE for the ABRONS

For the first time in its 99-year history, Henry Street Settlement's Abrons Arts Center won a prestigious Obie Award at the 59th Annual Obie Awards Ceremony held on May 19, 2014, at Webster Hall. The Obie Awards, given annually by The Village Voice, recognize excellence in Off-Broadway and Off-Off Broadway theater.

Presenting the award, Betsy Aidem (who make her NYC stage debut at the Abrons 30 years ago) and actor Lily Rabe, said, "In a venerable 100-year-old community center on the Lower East Side, there's an arts program with an exciting new feeling — revitalized, innovative, and vibrant, with new student courses, new artist residencies, and a teeming new calendar of events that involve some of the best-

known, some of the newest, and some of the bravest downtown artists." Accepting the award, Jay Wegman, Director of the Abrons, in a blissfully brief speech (the award was the last given during the evening), thanked the Obie committee and gratefully acknowledged Richard Abrons (himself a noted playwright) and his wife Iris who were in the house. (The generosity of the Abrons' family has

been instrumental in the success of the Arts Center.) David Garza, Executive Director of Henry Street, said, "Winning an Obie Award on the eve of the 100th anniversary of the Arts Center is a wonderful endorsement of our commitment to the arts. Since our founding, Henry Street has made critical

investments to create accessibility to the arts, which we believe are as necessary to the human spirit as food, shelter and clothing."

Henry Street Parties Like It's 1899

Henry Street Settlement hosted the debut event for the first-ever Lower East Side History Month on May 3, 2014 — a free block party, "Party Like It's 1899." The party featured cake, crafts, tours of the historic Settlement and dancing in the street to celebrate the 147th birthday of founder Lillian Wald

Among the nearly 400 attendees were firefighters from the FDNY's Ladder 18, Community Board 3's Susan Stetzer and Gigi Li, and New York City Council Member Margaret Chin, who praised Henry Street's staff and volunteers, noting, "They work hard, but they know when to have fun!" She apparently does too; Chin later led the conga line that wove through the crowd, as DJ Mambo played the "Conga."

Neighbors chalked the street, danced and enjoyed refreshments at the party.

RUTH TAUBE — Lower East **Side Community Hero**

When Meals on Wheels (MoW) staff learned that client Sarah Elliot wanted to see a jazz performance in Tribeca, Henry Street made her wish a reality.

The MoW staff knew that another client, Thorndyke Hairston, was also a jazz enthusiast, and invited him along. Their tickets to the "Highlights in Jazz 41st Anniversary" concert were subsidized, transportation was procured and Katie Hine, a social work intern, accompanied them to the concert.

The evening was a smash hit. Ms. Elliot and Mr. Hairston recognized the kindred jazz-head in one another, comparing notes about favorite musicians, songs and shows. Both emphasized what a welcome respite the outing was — alleviating the loneliness and isolation of the long cold winter.

"I was so happy I was delirious," said Ms. Elliot. "I felt drunk but didn't have a drop to drink!"



ADVOCACY & ENGAGEMENT: Putting the "Street" Back in Henry Street

More than 200 members of the Lower East Side community gathered at Henry Street on April 6, 2014, sacrificing a beautiful spring day to make their voices heard at the Settlement's first-ever Town Hall meeting.

They were joined by elected officials, including U.S. Congresswomen Carolyn Maloney and Nydia Velazguez, Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer, NYC Council Members Margaret Chin and Rosie Mendez, and representatives from the offices of State Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, State Senator Daniel Squadron and State Assemblyman Brian Kavanagh.

The Town Hall included full group meetings and smaller discussion groups led by facilitators on pressing issues like housing, education, gentrification and employment. Council Member Chin led a group for seniors conducted in Chinese.

"The Town Hall leveraged the findings of the 30 plus focus groups we conducted with program clients and community residents over the winter," said Jeremy Reiss, Deputy **Development Officer for Public Policy** and External Relations. "The day helped pave a roadmap for action."

FIX A BIKE? Yes. They Can!

Some 28 proud New Yorkers graduated from the first ever Bicycle Mechanic Skills Academy at a spirited ceremony held on March 20, 2014, at Henry Street's Workforce Development Center.

NY 1 News and *The LoDown* were there to cover the event.

The ten-week job program, an initiative of Henry Street and Recycle a Bicycle, combined hands-on classroom training with internships at local bike shops. David Garza, Executive Director of Henry Street, congratulated the graduates, noting that the Academy is the latest of Settlement "firsts." "We put the first nurse in a public school and opened the first shelter for homeless families," he said. "And now, we've created the first bicycle mechanic skills training academy."

One graduate, Steve Chabra, said, "This is a terrific program. I was really impressed with the large workspace filled with professional quality tools and equipment. When I saw that, I knew it was the real deal."

The graduates are a diverse group. Nearly half are under age 25; and 25 percent are women. Karen Overton, Executive Director of Recycle a Bicycle, specifically recruited women for the program because they are underrepresented in the bicycle industry.

The Lower East Side Employment Network (LESEN), a consortium which Henry Street co-founded, is a partner in the program and helped identify potential livingwage jobs for graduates.

This innovative program was made possible with funding from The Robin Hood Foundation, the Heckscher Foundation for Children and the Consortium for Worker Education.

Students in the first class of the Bicycle Mechanic Skills Workshop learned not only how to repair bicycles, but to build one from scratch.

Brian Betts from SLS Capital, who won the \$800 three-point shot competition, donated his winnings back to Henry Street.

Executive Director David Garza thanked the sponsors and participants. "Our Boys & Girls Republic opens doors for youth in this neighborhood to level the playing field for them. Thanks to you, the funds raised today will swing those doors wide open," he said. "Some 90 percent of the families in this neighborhood live below the poverty line, and in the past 18 months, three young people lost their lives to homicide. BGR is needed now more than ever."
