The **Abrons/Aranow Scholarship Fund** was established as an endowed fund in 1995 by the "younger generation" of the Abrons and Aranow families, Herbert Abrons, Rita Abrons Aranow and Richard Abrons, to honor their parents, Louis and Anne Abrons, lifelong Henry Street supporters.

Louis Abrons came to New York from Russia in 1890 at the age of six. Anne Schroeder Abrons was one of five children born on the Lower East Side to a mother who was widowed at a young age and received help from Henry Street. Both Louis and Anne were active members of Henry Street Settlement; Louis was a member of boys clubs and attended Camp Henry, and Anne was a member of the Homemakers Club. They met at a Settlement dance and married several years later. Louis became a prominent builder in New York City and, though he and Anne moved to New Rochelle, N.Y., they remained devoted to the Settlement and the people it served. Their sons Herbert and Richard served on the Board of Directors, as did Anne's brother, Hyman Schroeder. Herbert's daughter, Anne Abrons, joined the Board in 2003. The Abrons/Aranow Scholarship is the grandchildren's way of saying "thank you" to their parents, grandparents and Henry Street.

The **Bloom-Margolies Scholarship Fund** was established in 2018 through an extraordinary gift from the estate of Sylvia Bloom. A legal secretary for 67 years, Bloom amassed her fortune by purchasing the same stocks her boss did during her career at Cleary Gottlieb. Jane Lockshin, treasurer of the Henry Street Board and executor of her Aunt Sylvia's estate, directed the donation to Expanded Horizons to fulfill her aunt's wish to help low-income students access higher education. The Settlement created an endowment so that the fund can provide scholarships in perpetuity. The fund was named in memory of Sylvia Bloom-Margolies, her husband Raymond Margolies, and her sister, Ruth Bloom.

The **Bernard Tannenbaum Memorial Scholarship** was created to help high-achieving students from low-income families access and excel in higher education. This significant investment provides support for four years for exceptional students participating in Henry Street's programs to pave a path for their successful futures. The Bernard Tannenbaum Memorial Scholarship is made possible with generous lead support from Jeff and Nisa Tannenbaum, with additional contributions by the Fredman Family Foundation and D. Lifshitz.

The **Sobie Family Scholarship Fund**, created in 2014 to honor the family's immigrant roots, provides scholarship support for a college-bound Henry Street Settlement youth attending college outside New York City. The scholarship provides two years of meaningful support to dedicated Henry Street students to help them achieve their dreams and ease the financial burden of pursuing a college education.
