### Seeking Safety in a New Country

Immigrant family fleeing persecution finds comfort at UFC

Brandon grew up in an extremely homophobic household in his home country of Jamaica. "Homosexual acts" are illegal in Jamaica and punishable by up to 10 years in prison, making it nearly impossible for LGBTQ+ people to live their lives openly. Throughout his childhood, Brandon's grandmother, the family matriarch and a church leader, fueled the hatred and violence toward him. "I was the prime example in the household of what not to be," he says. Even at his job at an educational center in his community's church, he was constantly being bullied for his sexual orientation.

After a harrowing incident this past summer, Brandon, his partner of four years, and his partner's child made the extremely difficult decision to flee Jamaica. They arrived at the U.S.-Mexico border in

June, seeking asylum. After passing through detention and receiving their appropriate documents, Brandon's family traveled to New York from California, where an acquaintance on Staten Island allowed them to stay for a couple of months. By early August, however, they were facing homelessness. At the Prevention Assistance and Temporary Housing (PATH) intake center, the family was assigned to the Urban Family Center, one of Henry Street's apartment-style family shelters. "We are happy that our immigration status didn't determine whether Henry Street could accept us or not," Brandon says.

Since arriving, Brandon and his partner have secured employment, and their child, age 7, is enrolled in afterschool programming through the Settlement. "Henry Street has been life-changing for us," he says. "It's comforting knowing we have support and that our case worker, Scarlyn, has a lot of belief in us."

### **SEEKING SAFETY** cont'd from front

While the U.S. has more protections than Jamaica in place for LGBTQ+ people, Brandon says it's still nerve wracking to walk by police or talk openly in public. "We understand that people will still be homophobic," he acknowledges, "but the law is on our side here if we are discriminated against."

Brandon is receiving legal support from Manhattan Legal Services to pursue permanent asylum in the U.S. based on his well-founded fear of persecution should he return to Jamaica. "We want to stay here in New York City, and I want to go back to school." Brandon is hopeful for the future and is grateful to the UFC team for their support.
